

FORT JACKSON RULES & PRECAUTIONS

- ◆ Carrying weapons or firearms on Post is prohibited.
- ◆ For your safety, please remain on the trail. Do not wander into the impact area or ranges. You may encounter unexploded munitions.
- ◆ Use of metal detectors is prohibited.
- ◆ It is prohibited to damage or remove antiquities or archeological resources.
- ◆ Littering is prohibited.
- ◆ No vehicles will be left unattended for a period in excess of four days.
- ◆ No person shall park a vehicle for the purpose of displaying it "For Sale".
- ◆ Carry your own water, there are no water points available along the trail.
- ◆ Do not disturb wildlife or vegetation. Never feed animals on Fort Jackson.
- ◆ Use caution with cigarettes, no open fires.
- ◆ Keep pets on a leash.
- ◆ Military training is in progress including tracked vehicles and associated noises (artillery, small arms fire, hand grenades, simulators, etc.).
- ◆ Hunting in progress.

FORT JACKSON PASSAGE

LENGTH: 20 miles

USE: Hikers, Mountain Bikes

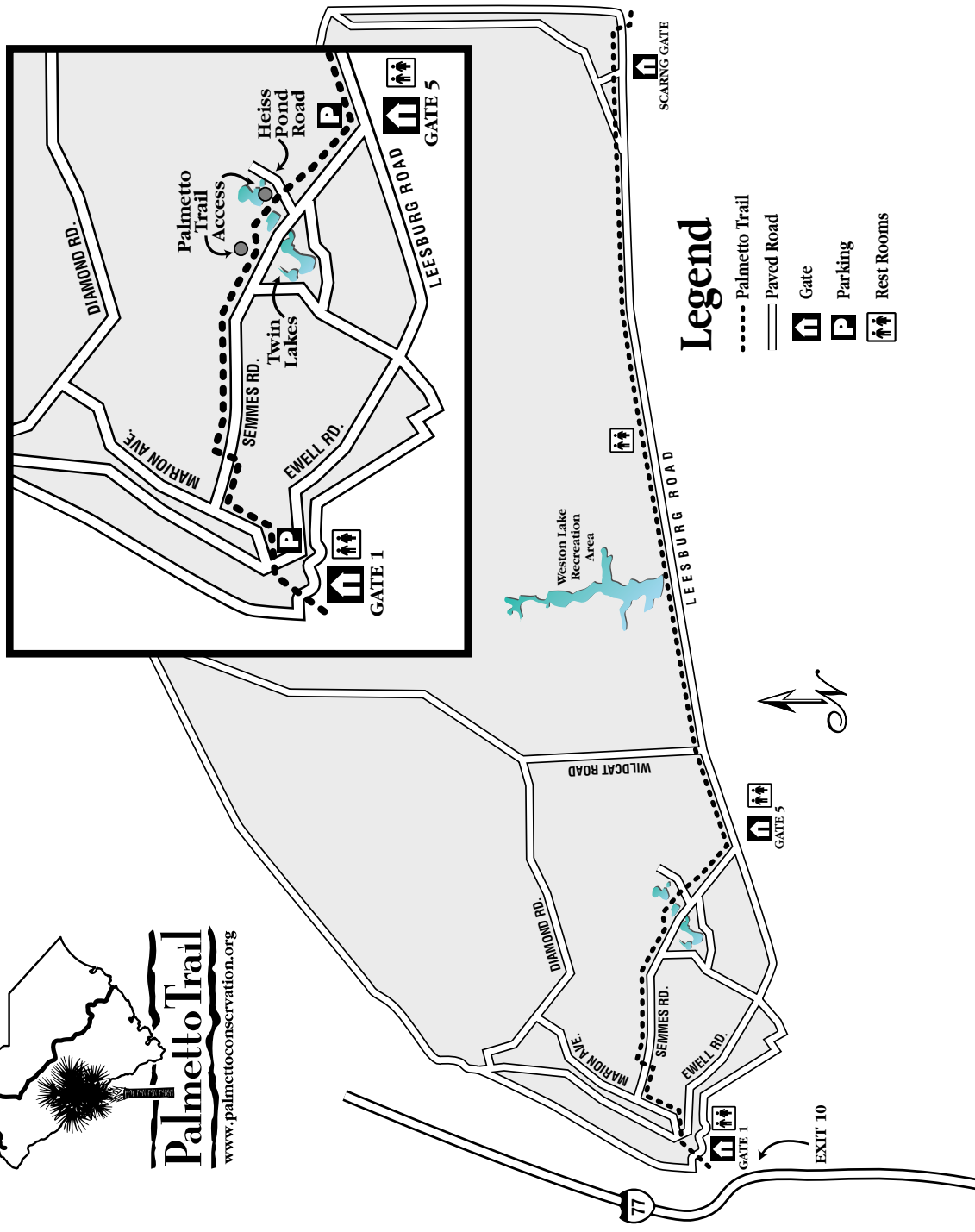
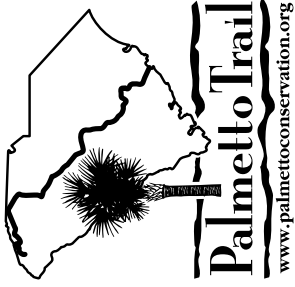
RESTRICTIONS:
No motor vehicles, no Equestrians

DIFFICULTY: Moderate

DIRECTIONS

TRAILHEAD AT GATE 1 — From I-77 take exit 10 (Fort Jackson Blvd.). Follow Fort Jackson Blvd. past Gate 1 into the Fort and follow the traffic circle to Ewell Road. Stay right on Ewell Road and you will see the parking area on your right. The kiosk is across the street from the parking area.

TRAILHEAD AT GATE 5 — From I-77 take exit 9 (Leesburg Road). Follow Leesburg Road (State Route 262) east toward Sumter. Go approximately 3 miles and the entrance to Gate 5 will be on your left. The kiosk and parking area are just inside the gate to the right.



FORT JACKSON PASSAGE

Of The Palmetto Trail

The Palmetto Trail's new Fort Jackson Passage takes you right through the heart and into the woods of this spectacular military facility. Fort Jackson was established in the year 1917 to answer the call for trained fighting men in World War I. The Fort was named in honor of Major General Andrew Jackson, a native son of the Palmetto State and seventh president of the United States. Today the installation covers 52,000 acres and is the Army's largest basic training center. In addition to hiking and mountain biking, this passage offers a great diversity in both plant and animal species. You may also see a platoon of soldiers on their daily drill.
